
Tully Hose Co, #1 Safety Night

Tully Artwork Studio Hosts Three Extraordinary Artists

On Sunday, October 14th, the Tully Artwork Studio began an exhibit featuring three extraordinary artists. The works of these artists will be on display from October 14th through October 27th. All presentations are open to the public and Free.

Laura Leigh Lanchantin

I am inspired by the connection that people have to landscape in both a historical and spiritual sense, and the energy that is contained and passed down over time through natural resources. My paintings come from a soulful connection with nature, anatomy, and land. I mimic the recurrent forms and shapes found in nature that speak to me, such as geometric spiral patterns, ripples, water, winding rivers, tree burls, and more. I weave these patterns into my own imaginary; curvilinear abstractions that contain both micro and macro elements. Rather than capturing realism, I am more drawn to the mood, energy, emotion, and abstract elements of land. Creating locally sourced, natural materials and painting en plein air is an act of capturing the primitive energy of the land in a tangible form.



Tom Huff

Tom Huff is a stone sculptor working in a variety of stones, styles, and themes, traditional and contemporary, and also creates mixed media/found object sculpture. In much of his work, Huff addresses the current situation of Native Americans mixing cultural, stereotypical, political, and autobiographical elements. He began carving stone, wood and antler at home, inspired by the artists at the

Cattaraugus Seneca

Nation, and later attended the Institute of American Indian Arts (AFA1979) in Santa Fe, NM, and the Rhode Island School of Design (BFA1984). Currently, he is an adjunct professor at the Onondaga Community College in Syracuse, NY, teaching an annual summer stone carving/ Iroquois Art course with other native artists. Tom curates the following shows: The Nuclear Indian Series, a solo installation; Tonto Revisited: Indian Stereotypes, an exhibit of found objects and images; and group exhibitions of contemporary Iroquois artists from the Six Nation Iroquois Confederacy. Tom is also a writer whose prose and poetry have been published, and is the editor of Stonedust, an Iroquois art newsletter. He also maintains a website, www.stonedust.com, an online gallery of Iroquois artists and art news. A former Trustee of the Iroquois Museum in Howes Cave, NY, he has served on various boards and committees of the Everson Museum, Syracuse Stone Quarry Hill Art Park, Cazenovia, and Atlatl, a national Native arts organization in Phoenix, Arizona, Tom presently lives on the Onondaga Nation near Syracuse, NY, with his wife, sculptor Trudi Shenandoah, his son Charlie, and daughter, Kali, where he maintains a carving studio.



Joanie DeSimone

With background in photography, art and nature illustration, Joan DeSimone has incorporated her knowledge and love of nature into her jewelry. Designs originate from extensive research and photographing wildlife during travels throughout the country.

"The creations are a tribute to nature and wildlife. I believe in the urgent need to save the environment, life and beauty on earth.

Since 1988, I have exhibited in shows throughout the eastern United States. I also worked with several shows as



a juror and as an advisory board member. I have also helped organize and direct a benefit art show for the National Aviary in Pittsburgh. The show is now one of the Aviary's largest events and fundraisers.

It is a privilege to be able to make a living creating what I am so passionate about while increasing awareness and educating at the same time. "
