SPOTLIGHT ON: C-OFOKLA

I recently had the pleasure of learning about an organization in Tully that is doing its part to protect our kettle lakes and educate the public in the process. The Cortland – Onondaga Federation of Kettle Lake Associations, Inc. (C-OFOKLA) is dedicated to the preservation of the kettle lakes, surrounding waters and watershed regions in Cortland and Onondaga counties.

C-OFOKLA does so by advocating awareness of lake resources, educating communities about watersheds and their protection, and promoting stewardship of those waterways.

C-OFOKLA began in September 25, 2008 when the Song Lake Property Owners Association hosted an informal gathering to meet the neighboring association members and learn about water issues in our region. Residential stormwater management education was presented by Onondaga County's Cornell Cooperative Extension and invasive species information was presented by Cortland County's Cornell Cooperative Extension.

What is a Kettle Lake

Kettles are depressions left behind after partially-buried ice blocks melt. Many are filled with water, and are then called "kettle lakes". The kettles in our area are Crooked Lake, Little Your Lake, Song Lake and Tully Lake.

Highlights: What did I learn?

This organization is working to combat the growing number of aquatic invasive species that are attempting to take over the lakes. In addition, data collected by the organization is shared with the local Universities and government organizations.

As the winter season nears, the Tully Village Board would like to remind residents that state and local law prohibits residents and business owners from depositing snow into public roads or allowing accumulation of ice and snow on sidewalks. If ice cannot be removed, the ice should be covered with salt, sand or similar material to ensure safe walking.

If violations pose an immediate and serious health or safety threat, the Village may correct the violation and charge the cost of work or services to the property owner, collectable when Village taxes are due.

As a follow up reminder, garbage cans should be brought in after collection, not left by the curb. Cans left out are not only an eyesore but can be a safety hazard when it comes to snow plowing both the road and sidewalk. Please be courteous to your fellow neighbors and bring the cans in.


