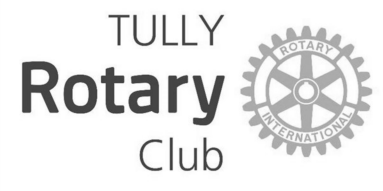

Ice Harvest History Display

Although there will not be an Ice Harvest Demonstration this winter; the Tully Area Historical Society will have Ice Harvest Industry History and pictures on display. Our hours are Monday, Tuesday, Friday & Saturday 9-1.

Ice Harvesting in Tully dates back to the late 1800's. It was once a main winter industry for Tully, providing ice for local Dairy Farmers on their farm; as well as for shipping their milk via railroad to as far away as New York City. Most farms maintained an Ice House on their property; as the harvesting period only lasted about 4-6 weeks. Men came great distances to help harvest ice. They boarded in local hotels and rooming houses. There were no insulated socks or footwear as we have today. Sometimes they ripped sheets and blankets into strips from the boarding houses to wrap around their feet in order to keep them from freezing. The Estey Ice House located near Green Lake is used and maintained by the Historical Society.

It is written that there were six large ice warehouses in the Tully area where ice was stored for shipping, as well as door-to-door delivery. In making household deliveries, the ice wagon would look for the sign in each house window as to what size ice block they wanted delivered (25# or 50#). The deliveryman would carry the block into the house and place it in the ice box. As refrigeration came about in the late 1930's, ice harvesting dwindled.

As we recover from the Pandemic, it's hopeful to have an Ice Harvest History weekend in 2022 with participation by local organizations and businesses.

Don't Wait — Check the Date!

Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years



Age matters when it comes to your smoke alarms. Check the manufacture dates on your smoke alarms today!

1 Remove the smoke alarm from the wall or ceiling.			2 Look at the back of the alarm for the date of manufacture.
3 Smoke alarms should be replaced 10 years from the date of manufacture.			4 Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.



A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.
