Update from Supervisor Masters

We have great news concerning the preservation of our historic train station. I had a chance conversation with the Village Mayor, sharing the Town's frustration over not obtaining enough monies for replacement of the roof on the historic train station. Mayor Flint-Morgan then told me that the Village was no longer able to utilize a portion of the monies that were originally allocated to the Village through the Main Street Grant. The Mayor then proposed that since the train station is in the Village, perhaps the Town could utilize this grant funding. I contacted our County Legislator Dave Knapp and he procured the use of these funds. Wednesday I received official notice from Onondaga County that the Town is allocated \$40,000 for this project. The Town would like to thank Tully Village Mayor Melissa Flint-Morgan and Onondaga County Legislator Dave Knapp!

Dave Knapp continues to be a great friend of Tully. Besides the \$40,000 for the train station, he has been instrumental in facilitating the water district for Tully Valley, procured \$5,000 for the Tully Free Library, \$10,000 for the FFA as well as the \$35,000 earlier this year for our Tennis courts. Thank You County Legislator Dave Knapp.

A public hearing on the Town's intent to opt-out of allowing adult-use cannabis licenses for retail dispensaries and on-site consumption of cannabis within the Town preceded the August Town Board meeting. During the following Town Board Meeting the Town Board unanimously passed legislation to opt-out of allowing retail sales and on-site use of cannabis within the Town. The public has 45 days to file a petition objecting to this decision which would drive the requirement for a public referendum. If no petition is received, the law will take effect 20 days after filing with New York State. If this op-out law is successfully enacted, the board can reverse this opt-out decision at any time. However, if the Town Board did not opt-out at this time, the Town would not be able to make a restriction going forward. **Please note: this law only regulates retail sales and on-site use lounges. General use and possession are regulated by State and federal laws. This point was misunderstood during our public hearing.

Also at our August meeting, the Town Board modified the previously approved wireless tower application allowing access from the newly adopted road, Hazel's Way, instead of Rt. 281.

The Town Board will be working on the 2022 fiscal budget through budget workshops which are currently scheduled Sept 29 and Oct. 13.



The Tully Train Depot was built in 1905 and served the community for passengers and freight until the railroad discontinued service in 1965. The building was used for storage and other things over the years until the Town of Tully secured a grant to purchase and preserve the building about five years ago. (

The first renovation work was done by the town, repairing the roof and replacing the floor in the former passenger area. For the next three years, the historical society held "Christmas @ the Station" each year the weekend following Thanksgiving. It was a continuation of the "Christmas @ the Station" previously held by Eve Carlton and Sonja Shepard for over eight years. It had been missed by many and the historical society had received many calls inquiring if it would be held again. Once we scheduled it, there's been an increasing number of central New Yorkers attending every year.

There still was a lot to be done to renovate the building.

Early in 2008, a former Tully resident whose contracting background was invaluable approached us volunteering his services for the renovation if materials were supplied. The offer was immediately accepted and the project was off and running.

The cypress wood paneling in the passenger area had rotted because of a leaking roof and had to be torn out and replaced. Not only did we have the labor (supplied by David Kinne) but businesses such as Kennedy Hardwood and Tully Building Materials stepped forward with discounted prices for the needed materials. Residents and others offered generous dollars to support the project.

In June of 2008, we held an open house to show the public our progress. The former passenger area is beautiful!

During the summer of 2012, the freight area was cleaned out, the wood flooring which had become rotted in spots was removed and a concrete floor was poured. Three rooms were added to the area -- a utility closet, an approved handicapped bathroom, and a "Food Prep" area. While this last area is not a health department approved kitchen, it can be used by those people catering their own parties, or by caterers who come in to serve food. A new refrigerator and two in-the-wall ovens are now available for use. Plenty of electrical outlets have been installed for coffee pots, crockpots, etc.

During 2013, a special spray-on insulation and fireproof paint were applied to the rafters and ceiling in the freight area. This insulation with the addition of the two stoves made it possible to hold "Christmas @ the Station" in both the front and back of the depot in November of 2013.
