Free Shredding Event for Tully Residents

The Town will be hosting a free shredding event for all Village and Town residents – and businesses, too!! Bring your paperwork, tax documents, bank statements and bills to the parking lot at the town hall to be securely shredded and taken to a waste management site for recycling (proof of residency required).

9:00am to 3:00pm

Village Treatment Plant, Community Drive, Tully, NY

This is your opportunity to dispose of residential household trash and debris. See specific limitations below.

The CLEAN-UP DAY is ONLY for Village and Town residents. You must show proof of residency and accompany vehicle at drop-off site. Proof of residency must have your street address on it. A Post Office Box will not be accepted as proof of residency.

NO PROOF OF RESIDENCY – NO DUMPING

All items must be less than 10 feet in length. All oil, gas and antifreeze products, *which are not acceptable for disposal*, must be drained from tanks and equipment.

*****IF YOU HAVE UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS ON BOARD, YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED ON SITE*****

WILL ACCEPT: Most General Rubbish, Appliances, Metal, Computers (Flat Screens Only), Electronics, Lawn & Garden Waste, Vehicle Batteries, Empty Drums and Pails cut in half

Tires will be accepted off the rim at a cost - (Prices subject to change)

Please have the correct amount of money.

16-inch and smaller tires: \$3.00

17-inch and larger-truck tires: \$7.00

Large tires: \$25.00

WILL NOT ACCEPT: TELEVISIONS, BED SPRINGS OR MATTRESSES, Rechargeable or disposable household batteries, Fluorescent tubes, Brush, Garbage Recyclables, Pails with lids, Whole drums, Paints, Chemicals, Oil, Gas, Antifreeze or any Hazardous Waste

THE FIRST EARTH DAY

Every year on April 22, Earth Day marks the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970.

Let's take a look at the last half-century of mobilization for action:

ORIGINS OF EARTH DAY

In the decades leading up to the first Earth Day, Americans were consuming vast amounts of leaded gas through massive and inefficient automobiles. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of the consequences from either the law or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. Until this point, mainstream America remained largely oblivious to environmental concerns and how a polluted environment threatens human health.

However, the stage was set for change with the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller *Silent Spring* in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries as it raised public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment and the inextricable links between pollution and public health.

THE IDEA FOR THE FIRST EARTH DAY

Senator Gaylord Nelson, the junior senator from Wisconsin, had long been concerned about the deteriorating environment in the United States. Then in January 1969, he and many others witnessed the ravages of a massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, Senator Nelson wanted to infuse the energy of student anti-war protests with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pollution. Senator Nelson announced the idea for a teach-in on college campuses to the national media, and persuaded Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair. They recruited Denis Hayes, a young activist, to organize the campus teach-ins and they choose April 22, a weekday falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, to maximize the greatest student participation.

Tully's Nature Areas

Are you in need of some fresh air? Does your circulatory system need to be energized? Are you trying to get healthy and lose a little weight? Are you feeling a little depressed about the world's problems? Tully Action Group has a suggestion that could help solve those problems. It is time to bundle up with appropriate boots, hats and mittens and try hiking in one of Tully's two Nature Areas. Both areas are CNY Land Trust Properties; Tully Action Group provides the stewards and local management; however, many kind neighbors to both properties provide manual labor and serve as curators as well. All Hikers are asked to help keep our properties safe and clean.

Tracy Lake Nature Area has well defined trails with benches along the way which were built by our local Boy Scouts. The trails are easy to navigate with small inclines here and there and the lookout at Tracy Lake can be interesting watching for playful wildlife, and if you are patient, you may see a heron or other resident bird life this time of year. Be sure to take your binoculars and always wear sturdy hiking shoes or boots appropriate for the season. You may access the parking area at the corner of Route 80 and Gatehouse Rd. South Meadows Nature Area also has well defined trails with benches, and a bridge over a gentle stream, but the terrain is very different from that of Tracy Lake. This area is a progression of inclines broken up by open meadows especially suitable for grassland birds to raise their young. Our local school cross country athletes have been known to train on this course. At the top of the second meadow, you will find a bench for viewing the Town and village of Tully and the hillsides to the west and North. If your children are along, see how many landmarks they can recognize? Finally, from the top you may continue on a circular path that brings you down gently through a variety of hardwood trees, until you reconnect with the main trail, bringing you back to the main entrance and bridge. You may access parking at Cummings Park just opposite Dave's Tully Auto Shop on Truxton Hill Road, then proceed 100 feet south to the South Meadows entry sign.
