The Onondaga Nation and the Trustees recognize the value of the Fellows Falls area of the Tully Valley to the public and are committed to working with the community to develop safe, ecologically compatible public access to Fellows Falls.

At this time, the Trustees and the Onondaga Nation are working with Honeywell to finalize the property transfer to the Onondaga Nation. Development of the Healing and Caretaking Plan referenced in the Addendum (including development of safe, ecologically compatible public access to Fellows Falls) will begin after the property transfer is complete (development of the Healing and Caretaking Plan is anticipated to begin after September 2024).

As noted in the Draft RP/EA Addendum, The Onondaga Nation will evaluate public access to Fellows Falls during development of a Healing and Caretaking Plan (HCP) for the Preserve, in consultation with the Trustees. Parking and neighborhood impacts will be considered as part of evaluating potential options for public access to Fellows Falls

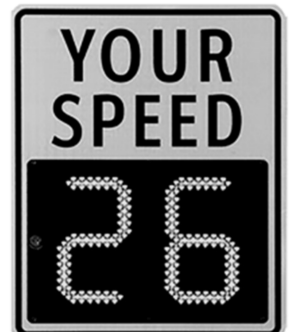
on Meetinghouse Road on Tuesday, August 13 at 7:00 pm.

From the Village

The village trustees are asking that the speed signs that greet you as you enter the village not be used as a target for sports balls. It has come to our attention that at least one of the signs was being used to record the speed at which someone could throw a football. Unfortunately, the sign in question suffered a direct hit and now needs to be repaired. The speed signs are the result of a grant applied for by the village, but repairs are the village's responsibility.



“King’s Corner” Origin

It seems appropriate with “King’s Corner Market” coming on August 1st that we provide some history about the corner. This article is from the archives at the Tully Area Historical Society and appeared in the August 1, 2016, issue of “Southern Hills News”.

In 1818, Henry Fedello King moved from Connecticut to Tully. He built a modest building on the southeast corner of the main intersection which became King’s Barter Store. No money ever changed hands. Instead, Mr. King traded potash from the farmers, and this he carted to Albany by ox team and brought back clothing and farm tools. It remained King’s Barter Store through 1872.

The Boutelle family managed a business at this location from 1873 for a short time. Hulbert & Meara then operated a store there from 1889-1914. At that time there was a room with a door left of the main entrance which was the public telephone office with only one telephone for use by all villagers from 1889-1901. There was also a water pump and a weighing station on the side of the building.

From 1915-1945 this building was Gallinger’s Grocery Store. Many of you may remember Norma Gallinger White, 1927 graduate of Tully High School and life resident of Tully. She was the daughter of Rueben and Lena Gallinger, proprietors of the store.

From 1945-1961 this was the home of Wortley’s Drug Store. You could stop in not only for prescriptions and supplies but enjoy ice cream and other soda fountain treats. Dr. Stephen Opalat occupied this building from 1962-1987.

Most recently, CURVES occupied the building from 2004-2014. Presently occupied sine 2006, it currently houses Earth 2 Soul, a massage and bodywork therapy office and the Zen Den a community room available for short term rentals to host events..

Kettle Lakes

A kettle (also known as a kettle hole, kettlehole, or pothole) is a depression or hole in an outwash plain formed by re-treating glaciers or draining floodwaters. The kettles are formed as a result of blocks of dead ice left behind by retreating glaciers, which become surrounded by sediment deposited by meltwater streams as there is increased friction. The ice becomes buried in the sediment and when the ice melts, a depression is left called a kettle hole, creating a dimpled appearance on the outwash plain. Lakes often fill these kettles; these are called kettle hole lakes. Another source is the sudden drainage of an ice-dammed lake and when the block melts, the hole it leaves behind is a kettle. As the ice melts, ramparts can form around the edge of the kettle hole. The lakes that fill these holes are seldom more than 10 m (33 ft) deep and eventually fill with sediment. In acidic conditions, a kettle bog may form but in alkaline conditions, it will be kettle peatland.

Tully is home to four notable kettle lakes: Crooked Lake, Little York Lake, Song Lake, and Tully Lake. For more information please visit <https://www.kettlelakesassociation.org/>
