This year is the 20th of the concert series which made its debut at the Tully Train Station on the Station's 100th birthday in 2005, Songs for a Winter's Night.

For these 20 years, with the exception of pandemic years 2020-2021, the Tully Arts Council has hosted in each year 5 Sunday evening performances in the first weeks of January and February, featuring local and regional musical groups, and occasionally a few from elsewhere in the nation. These wonderful acts, the outstanding acoustics of the building, the crackling warmth of the fire and delicious light food served from the train station's former ticket window have entertained what from the very beginning have been delightful audiences who see these performances as concerts, and listen respectfully, often singing along, sometimes in harmony.

Two years ago, a new element was added, where a number of the musicians who played in earlier weeks come back to the station and, at the end of the 2 bands' performances, join in a high-energy jam. This new part of the show has proven very popular with the audiences, who often join in.

The name of the series comes from the first year, when the first act ever to play was townsperson Dave Zawadzki, who led off the series with Song for a Winter's Night by Gordon Lightfoot. For every year up until this one, Dave has opened every concert with that song.

This year, owing to financial issues, the Arts Council can only afford to do one winter concert at the Train Station, but it's going to be a great one. Beloved band Butternut Creek Revival will open for legendary international guitar virtuoso and singer Loren Barrigar and his gifted son LJ, and past musicians who have headlined the concerts are being invited back to join in the jam. Potentially in subsequent years those bands will be invited to headline again.

This year, due to limited seating, tickets will be available at Fine Wine Tully on Clinton Street/Rte 80 for \$10 each. Don't wait!

And don't miss this remarkable show--it's one of the best antidotes to cold winter nights!

## Southern Hills Wind Watch - January 2025

Join Us for an Informational Meeting on January 29th

Southern Hills Wind Watch (SHWW) invites you to attend an informational session on **January 29, 2025**, from **6:30 PM to 8:00 PM** at the Tully High School auditorium. This meeting is an opportunity for residents to learn more about the proposed industrial wind turbine project and its potential impacts. A snow date is scheduled for **February 4, 2025**.

#### **Purpose of the Meeting**

This session will provide key information about the wind turbine project and how it could affect our community, environment, and individual properties. It's also an opportunity to hear updates about SHWW's efforts to protect our area and learn how you can get involved.

During the meeting, we will address potential impacts, including:

- Landslide risks
- Property values
- Damage to Kettle Lakes and nearby creeks
- Shadow flicker
- Endangered wildlife

## Ice Harvesting

The harvesting of ice on the Tully Kettle Lakes was a major industry dating back over 150 years, employing several hundred people in the area, up to the 1930's. Once harvested the ice was stored in one of four warehouses in the village and used to transport local farmers' milk via the railroad to as far away as New York City. It was also stored in these warehouses for door-to-door delivery to residences for use in their ice boxes up until the refrigerator came about in the 1930's. Many farmers had ice houses on their property for their own milk storage. The Estey Ice House is located near Green Lake and has been used there for storing ice from previous harvesting events.

In February, the Historical Society will have a pictorial display, as well as a video playing on local ice harvesting. Many tools are on display, as well. If the cold weather keeps up, there is an outside chance of possibly having an ice harvest reenactment. Should it become a reality, information will be posted on the Tully Historical Society website.
